Our Head Start programs and services continue to serve over 500 children and their families in Passaic County, offering not only early education but also wraparound services that support their growth and well-being. In partnership with Clifton Pre-K, we expanded our reach, serving an additional 165 children.

 - 7. Develop strategies and procedures to ensure technological advances in all service areas.


The Families we serve

Our agency consists of 7 Early Head Start classrooms and 22 Head Start classrooms. Our Head Start classrooms consist of 7 classrooms at our Head Start sites and 15 classrooms in Clifton Public Schools under our Clifton School District collaboration. Our home-based program serves 66 children and 9 pregnant women.

Community and Family Partnerships







A total of 364 Head Start and 138 Early Head Start children were enrolled during the school year, a combined total enrollment of 502 children and pregnant women.

Center for Family Resources Head Start/Early Head Start staff assisted and referred enrolled families to community resources regarding rental, mortgage and utility assistance, food pantry. Enrolled families are encouraged to participate in the Family Partnership Goal Setting Process which helps families in developing family goals with positive outcomes and family well-being. As an agency, we also have two vans on site to help families with transportation to appointments or any service needed.

Volunteers are an integral piece in the effectiveness and operation of the Head Start program. Volunteers include the Governing Board, classroom volunteers, parent and community volunteers, parent activities, monthly parent meetings and program planning assistance. Increased planned parent activities included movie outings, classroom activities led by parents, building bird houses, outdoor dance party, multicultural events and activities and paint nights.




Children who aged out of ehs: 1

Early Head Start: The child assessment provided us with important information regarding growth in child development during the 2023-2024 school year. The children had the most growth in the areas of cognitive, literacy, and mathematics according to Teaching Strategies GOLD. They had some growth in the areas of social-emotional, physical, and language according to Teaching Strategies GOLD data collected through the year.






The children in EHS center based had growth in the area of mathematics. The teachers incorporated information that they learned during professional development into classroom activities. Math is used throughout the day in our EHS classrooms. During mealtimes the children are learning math vocabulary such as more, big, small, and numbers. The teachers are incorporating math during choice time, group time, and even personal care time.

The Head Start children demonstrated gains in the Social/Emotional and Cognitive areas. As a program, emotional literacy is a cornerstone in helping children label and regulate their emotions. Books, games and Yoga give children a solid foundation in this critical area. Cognitive gains emphasized students attending and persisting at tasks, engaging in problem-solving scenarios and practicing higher-order thinking skills.

Kindergarten transition and school readiness is an integral process in the CFR program. There is a focus on preparing for Kindergarten by providing specific support strategies. Families are notified about registration and orientation dates at their respective school districts. Workshops on Going to Kindergarten have been offered at parent committee meetings. Children are given more individualized instruction and take home books about going to school. Children also experience riding on a bus! We have two buses at Center for Family Resources that transport children to and from school in Pompton Lakes and Ringwood.





The health team at Center for Family Resources held conferences with the family service and home base workers to ensure all children stay up to date with their physical and oral health care. We work with our local health departments and clinics to help children with no health insurance gain access to free health care. We are pleased to have partnerships with Mountainside Medical Center and Smile Central who have provided dental education workshops and dental screenings. Lead Poisoning prevention workshops provided by Partnership for Maternal and Child Health of Northern New Jersey took place in our Head Start Classrooms. Vision and hearing screenings were performed by the health team, the Lions Club of West Milford and Passaic County and the Clifton District Pre- K nursing staff.






In the 2023-2024 school year, Early Head Start completed the year with 94% of children covered by Health Insurance and 65% of children receiving preventative oral health care





Non-Federal Share is based on 20% of Federal Expenses



Additional Grants

CFR administers several vital grants that support community services. Additional funding from Passaic County enables CFR to facilitate Case Management services and **A Safe Place**, providing essential resources and support for individuals in need. State funding from New Jersey helps operate the **Highlands Family Success Center** in West Milford, fostering family well-being and community engagement. Federal support, through the
